██████████ is a retired U.S. Army veteran and one of the founding members of the Hiawatha Valley Family Beyond the Yellow Ribbon Program here in Red Wing. He's not just involved—he's a driving force behind veteran advocacy in our community. ██████████ focuses on restoring dignity and access for those who've served, especially veterans dealing with housing instability and/or mental health challenges.

Within the past 18 months, he's led the charge in helping nine unhoused veterans in Red Wing get into stable housing, and he doesn't stop there. ██████████ makes sure they're connected to wrap-around services—mental health support, medical care, job resources—whatever it takes to help them rebuild their lives with the respect they deserve.

And when veterans are housed and supported, the entire community benefits. Stable housing reduces emergency service calls, improves public health, and strengthens neighborhood safety. ██████████ work doesn't just change individual lives—it makes Red Wing a safer, more compassionate place for everyone.

His impact is real, lasting, and deeply aligned with the values of the Amos Owen Award.

What characteristics does this person display that show a commitment to human rights?

██████████ exemplifies humility, compassion, and unwavering dedication. Whether working with veterans or community members in need, he approaches every individual with deep respect and empathy—never judging, always serving. He's a fierce advocate for ensuring that veterans receive the care, dignity, and recognition they've earned through their service. After more than 20 years in the U.S. Army, ██████████ continues to serve—not in uniform, but through tireless advocacy for local veterans and their families. His leadership is hands-on, his courage is moral, and his impact is deeply personal. He embodies the spirit of Amos Owen: a guardian of human dignity and a voice for those too often overlooked.

On a personal note, when I'm faced with a difficult decision while helping others, I often pause and ask myself, "What would ██████████ do?" That reflection guides me toward integrity, compassion, and action—just as ██████████ does every day.

I worked closely with [REDACTED] in the founding of CARE Clinic and in the founding of the Hispanic Family Therapy Program, which is a joint venture between CARE Clinic and Hispanic Outreach. It is due to [REDACTED] remarkable leadership in creating these programs that I am nominating her for this humanitarian award, but I will share a list of other services that [REDACTED] has provided to the community as a nurse, a psychologist, and a caring human being.

[REDACTED] leadership in founding CARE Clinic has positively impacted many lives in our community. CARE Clinic's history began when a health care mission team that [REDACTED] was a part of traveled to the region devastated by hurricane Katrina. The team operated free clinics in church basements and community centers. While there, [REDACTED] and her team posed a question: "They had traveled far to set up a free clinic for disaster victims... was there a need closer to home for similar services?" When they arrived back in Red Wing, they met as a group and invited other stakeholders to the table. This grassroots committee, of which I became involved, quickly gained momentum. The vision became clear; the mission was to mobilize volunteers to provide free health care for people who are uninsured and have limited incomes. [REDACTED] is a natural leader; she had the humanitarian focus, the organizational knowledge, the people skills, and the spiritual compass to make her the perfect founding board chair for CARE Clinic. The grassroots committee nominated her as our leader, and [REDACTED] accepted. This was an enormous task, but she was up for the challenge. Within just over a year from the first grassroots meeting, CARE Clinic served its first patient in January of 2010. CARE Clinic started as a free medical clinic that also offered free medications and connection to community resources. We decided to start small and grow as patients' needs guided us. Very soon after opening, it was clear that there was a critical need for mental health therapy for uninsured community members. In addition to her role as board chair, [REDACTED] recruited fellow therapists to volunteer, and she began the mental health program of CARE Clinic. In 2015, Hispanic Outreach contacted [REDACTED] and CARE Clinic to see if we could partner to bring a bilingual (Spanish and English) mental health therapist to the community; they had identified a great need within the Latino community. [REDACTED] once again led the development of a CARE Clinic program, the Hispanic Family Therapy Program. She provided oversight to the program for many years as CARE Clinic's volunteer Mental Health Director.

The health and lives of thousands of individuals and families have been positively impacted by the collective work of those involved in CARE Clinic. The professional services are critical in the lives of many people. Just as important as the direct services,

the spirit of CARE Clinic that was established by [REDACTED] at its founding has also been healing for many people. [REDACTED] led us in establishing our values at CARE Clinic, and they continue to lead and guide us today.

CARE Clinic Values:

1. Welcoming and Inclusive
2. Grassroots
3. Collaborative
4. Respect and Dignity
5. Stewardship of Patient, Volunteer, and Donor Resources.

In CARE Clinic's patient satisfaction survey last year, 100% of 115 patients surveyed reported that "CARE Clinic personnel were respectful and caring!" That is remarkable, and I believe [REDACTED] legacy at CARE Clinic continues to impact the spirit of the clinic.

In addition to her work with CARE Clinic, [REDACTED] professional colleagues share the following roles she has had in the community:

[REDACTED] was a public health nurse for Goodhue County for many years. [REDACTED] worked in county Mental Health where she was invaluable in helping to improve efficiency and ethical processes within the department. She refined the psychological assessment process and therapy processes for individuals seeking assessment services from outside social services or county agencies.

[REDACTED] helped build a healthy network of mental health providers in Red Wing by offering technical support and an open door collaborative spirit in offering any help necessary. She has supervised new mental health professionals in the field.

[REDACTED] served on a fundraising committee with her father to raise enough money locally for the Youth Outreach building (now renamed RiseUp Red Wing).

[REDACTED], Executive Director of Hispanic Outreach shares these activities which [REDACTED] has initiated and led:

[REDACTED], have been wonderful mentors for local youth. They have guided young people in making future college decisions and provide assistance with the paperwork and process. [REDACTED] has helped many young Hispanic youth and families navigate their lives in Red Wing.

[REDACTED] also led "Friends of Immigrants (FOI)" from 2017 - early 2021. FOI was formed in early 2017. This was shortly after the election of Donald Trump when political rhetoric was especially heated about the place of immigrants in America. The

██████ has not only dedicated countless hours to obtaining multiple degrees pertaining to human rights and helping others through difficult situations, but also he has served in the capacity of a labor relations consultant, various human resource director positions, served as the Director of Equity and Compliance for Metropolitan University, Director of Academic and Global Programs for University of Wisconsin, Madison, Human Resource/Compliance Officer for the University of Wisconsin, River Falls, and the Governmental Affairs, Human Resources and Labor Relations Director for Qwest Communications. He is also has served on the MN Supreme Court Dispute Roster as a mediator. ██████ has worked tirelessly for over 25 years advocating for underserved populations advocating for at risk students, advocating for individuals who need mental health services, offering his knowledge to school districts when facing issues with discrimination, served on numerous school superintendent searches nationwide ensuring the individual selected best represents the district served, and is a certified mediator who is allowed to serve under the MN Supreme Court Rule 114. ██████ has been the "go to guy" for Red Wing Public Schools when facing concerns regarding human rights and is respected for his calm demeanor and skills in defusing a situation in a manner where all parties feel heard and validated. ██████ was nominated by students of the Red Wing High School as "Teacher of the Month" as a substitute teacher, exemplifying the level of respect and admiration the students felt for ██████ as a teacher.

What characteristics does this person display that show a commitment to human rights?

██████ has the ability to remain calm and respectful in difficult situations. He is not one to shy away from a difficult conversation, rather he invites you into the conversation in a manner where all parties feel safe to express their concerns and opinions. ██████ calm demeanor along with his extensive education and work experience is what is needed to resolve conflict with a positive outcome. ██████ grew up in Red Wing as one of the 1st African American families to call Red Wing their home. As a young man ██████ was often angry of the discrimination he faced in Red Wing. Once such example was when he brought a date to the Sheldon Theater. He and his date had their snacks and were waiting for the movie to start when his date's father entered the theater and demanded his daughter leave with him rather than being on a date with an African American teen. ██████ had to endure the embarrassment of that ordeal and remained in the theater without his date. ██████ reflects back on that moment often and knows that was a pivotal time for him as he knew at that point he needed to be able to convince others he was worthy of their respect in spite of being African American. ██████ used that experience to gain the education he did and committed his life to helping others resolve experiences such as he lived. Besides being highly educated, ██████ has chosen his career path in positions where he was able to help others whether that was

where they needed an advocate.

█████ willingly lends his experiences, connections, and knowledge when asked for help with a situation, project or event when it means helping someone in an underserved population.

█████ constantly shows a strong belief in the inherent dignity and equality of others through his education, his professional skills, and his determination to help those in need whether that is an individual, a specific group, or his community as a whole.

- Advocacy for Racial Equity in Education: When her daughter was targeted by racial slurs at school and administrators failed to act, ██████ organized and spoke out at school board meetings, demanding accountability and stronger protections for students of color.
- Community Engagement: She attended and participated in town board meetings, bringing awareness to issues of racial injustice and discrimination. ██████ consistently raises her voice on behalf of families and children who experience inequities, ensuring their struggles are not dismissed.

- Resilience – She channels her personal experiences, including the discrimination faced by her own daughter, into strength that fuels her fight for change and better protection for others.
- Leadership – By speaking out and taking action ██████ inspires others in our community to find their voice and stand up against injustice.

Together, these characteristics reflect her unwavering commitment to human rights and make her a powerful advocate for change in Red Wing.

██████ tireless work has made our city more aware, more compassionate, and more accountable. She demonstrates the values my grandfather Amos Owen lived by—standing up against injustice, advocating for those without a voice, and fostering a community built on respect and human dignity.
